Many diaries were retained by the soldier or their family, however some of the surviving diaries are held in the collections of Australian cultural institutions including the Australian War Memorial,<sup>[11]</sup> National Archives of Australia,<sup>[12]</sup> State Library of New South Wales,<sup>[1</sup> Library of Queensland,<sup>[14]</sup> State Library of South Australia,<sup>[15]</sup> and State Library of Victoria.<sup>[16][17]</sup> The Australian War Memorial and the State Library of New South Wales were the first in Australia to attempt to collect war diaries on a large scale.<sup>[6]:134</sup> The urge to collect documents reflected contemporary understandings of history and research, which emphasised the role of primary sources and saw history as a science instead of an art.<sup>[6]:138</sup> While the Library prioritised original documents over copies,<sup>[6]:137</sup> the Memorial instead collect both original documents and copies.<sup>[6]:149</sup>

William Ifould, Principal Librarian at the Library,<sup>[18]</sup> led a collecting drive which began within six months of the conclusion of the war.<sup>[8]:136</sup> [19]:90</sup> Ifould arranged for advertisements in newspapers across Australia offering to buy relevant papers for the Library,<sup>[20][21][22]</sup> ar reached out to soldiers through the Returned Soldiers' Association of New South Wales.<sup>[8]:137</sup> Efforts focused on diaries documenting training and active service,<sup>[19]:92</sup> with accounts recorded "at the moment" or as soon after as possible considered the most useful.<sup>[8]:137</sup>

The Memorial aimed to document the whole of Australia's war experience, initially focusing on published sources and the official records of the war.<sup>[6]:142</sup> The Memorial began collecting personal documents including diaries in 1927.<sup>[6]:142</sup> It was Arthur Bazley, historian Charles Bean's assistant at the Memorial, who suggested using the addresses recorded in the Roll of Honour Circulars to contact next-of-kin (and, later, servicemen and women directly<sup>[6]:149</sup>) to ask for diaries and personal papers to be donated.<sup>[6]:142</sup> John Treloar, Di of the Memorial, publicised the project and encouraged donations.<sup>[6]:142</sup>

In total, 416,809 Australians enlisted for service.<sup>[23]</sup> Only 500 diaries were collected by the Library, despite wide advertising, while approximately one in four soldiers or families contacted by the Memorial donated material.<sup>[6],151</sup>
